Pupil Premium

The pupil premium was introduced in April 2011 and is allocated to schools to work with pupils who have been registered for free school meals at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6 FSM'). Schools also receive funding for children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months, and children of service personnel. Recently adopted pupils also receive funding but this has to be applied for separately during the year.

Some Background Information from the Department for Education

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

In most cases the Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. **It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent**, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit. However they will be held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income families. New measures will be included in the performance tables that will capture the achievement of those deprived pupils covered by the Pupil Premium. From September 2012, schools will be required to publish online information about how they have used the Premium. This will ensure that parents and others are made fully aware of the attainment of pupils covered by the premium.

Financial year 2019 to 2020

In the 2019 to 2020 financial year, schools will receive the following funding for each child registered as eligible for/as:

- free school meals at any point in the last 6 years: £1,320 for pupils in reception year to year 6 (FSM and FSM6)
- looked after children/ children adopted: £2,300
- service children: £300

Pupil Premium at Chuter Ede 2019-20

£52,800 in total for 2019-20 (based on Budget figures April 2019)

NB: this can fluctuate throughout the year depending on movement of children and family circumstances.

What does this mean for children at Chuter Ede Primary School?

- At Chuter Ede our ethos is to provide every child with high quality teaching and learning experiences. We have a shared responsibility to raise aspirations for all our pupils.
- We provide small group or individual support for any children who are vulnerable or at risk whenever we feel it is required in terms of learning difficulty.
- We provide additional TA's for small group teaching for children with similar difficulties on a daily or weekly basis depending on the degree of difficulty.
- We provide extra-curricular activities targeted specifically to pupil premium children.
- We can subsidise visits and trips up to 50% for FSM children.
- We provide staff with training (identified from the School Development Plan) in order to support children across the school with various interventions.
- We have a pupil premium champion, who monitors closely the progress of the children, liaising with staff to provide the best support for each child.
- Our senior management team champion certain pupil premium children, in order to gain a fuller picture of each child and their strengths and areas for support.

Barriers to learning identified at Chuter Ede

- Limited parental engagement from some parents in school.
- Attendance of PP children.
- Lack of confidence/self esteem amongst children and families.
- Social and emotional needs which impacts on readiness for learning.
- Negative personal experiences outside of school with social care involvement.
- Lack of aspiration.

The context and catchment of Chuter Ede

- Chuter Ede serves the villages of Balderton and Fernwood where there is a new housing development. (Over 90% of pupils come from the catchment area.) The remainder come from other private and council housing outside the catchment area. (RAISE ONLINE)
- The school is significantly larger than the national average with roughly equal numbers of boys and girls; these are fairly equally distributed throughout the classes. (RAISE)
- The school has an excellent reputation and is always heavily oversubscribed.
- The Fernwood Annex opened in September 2012. This building forms part of Chuter Ede and now houses 210 pupils (1 class per year group). The main site houses 420 children (2 classes per year group).
- The percentage of children receiving free school meals is 5.5% (school data).
- 6.3% of children currently have English as a second language.
- All these figures are below the national average.
- In recent years the school has achieved Eco Schools Bronze Award, Activemark, Healthy Schools Gold, Sainsbury's Schools Games Gold award and Artsmark Gold awards. We have also achieved the Stephen Lawrence Racial Equality Award.
