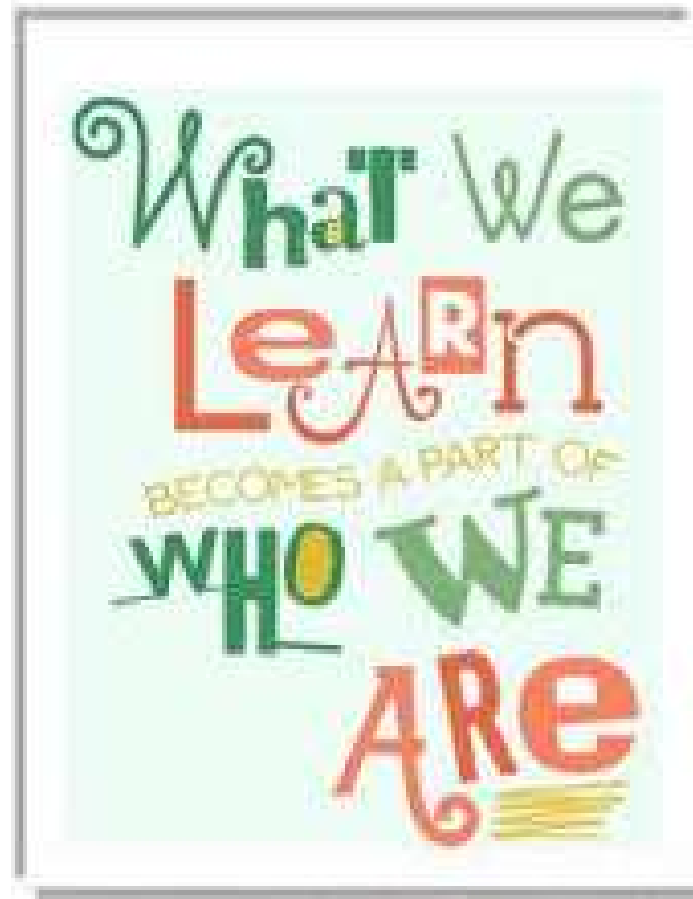

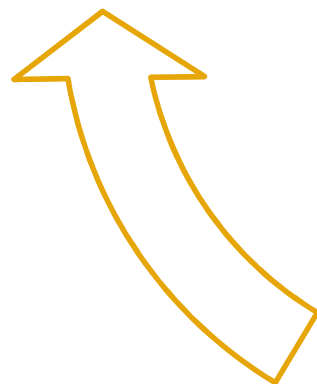

- **Child Readiness**– ways to help your child get ready for school related to their social skills, independence, curiosity and ready for learning.

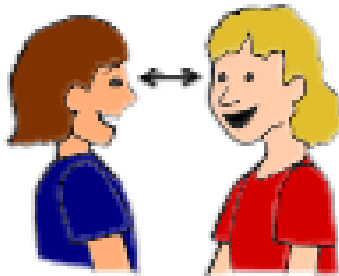
- **School Readiness**– based on learning and activities to support with this at home (details about transition will be given at a later date).

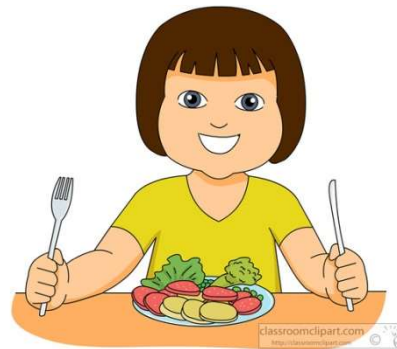

Curiosity about the world



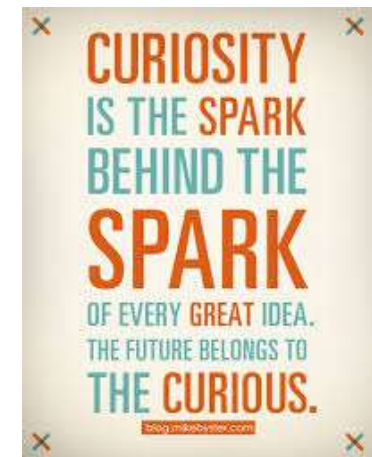
Your child/children might have already started asking questions about the world around them.

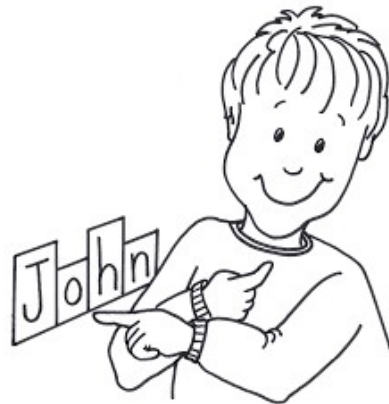
We will be continuing with your child's learning and development from nursery or their pre-school setting, following the current *Development Matters* document.

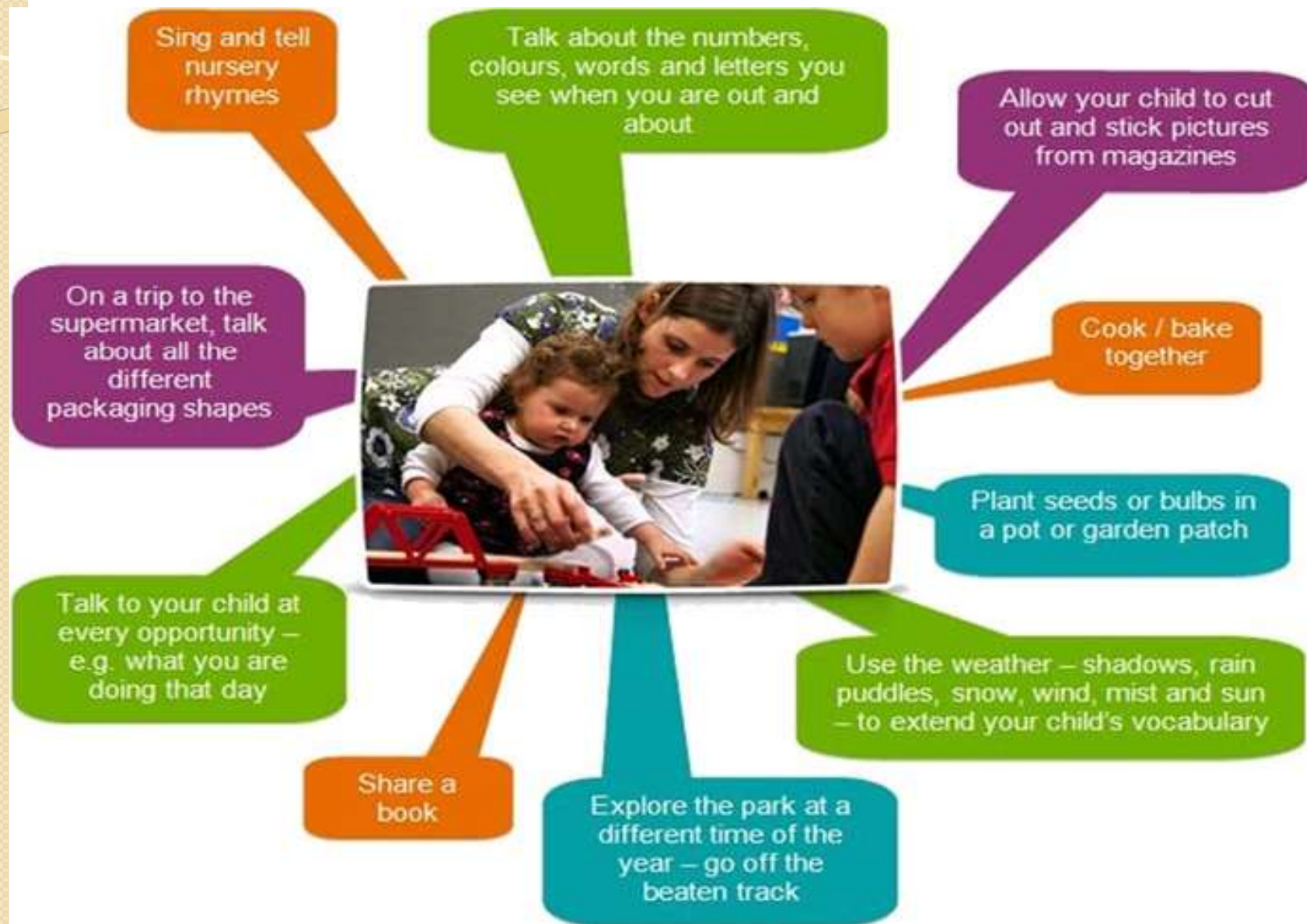

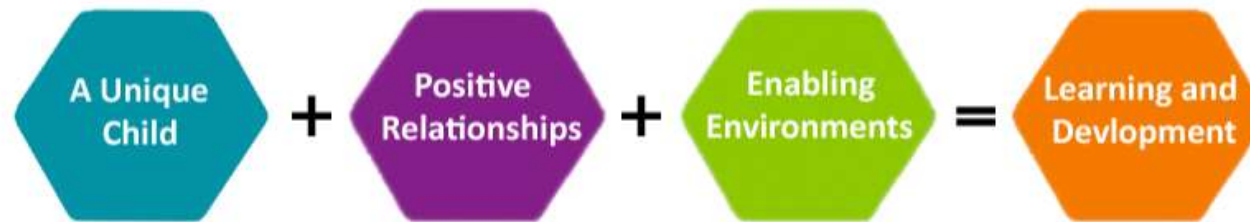
